





Analysis on Mattel (MAT) and Hasbro (HAS) and the Toy Industry

MAT Share Price: \$13.84

HAS Share Price: \$93.50


MAT YTD: -10%

HAS YTD: +4.6%

- Looking at their multiples HAS is cheaper in almost every category aside from last twelve month earnings
- Its not in the chart but on a forward price to sales basis that is where MAT is considerably cheaper at 1.0x vs. HAS at 2.3x
- Not going to lie though given the industry and their numbers these numbers still look pretty expensive to me
- MAT reported operating profit at \$122M vs. last year's \$86.2M, an increase of 41% their first time seeing growth in 8 quarters
- HAS reported operating profit of \$313M vs. last year's \$361M
- Mind you both bring in roughly identical revs so you can see the difference in margins between the two
- the catch is that HAS is larger but falling vs. MAT at a lower margin but growing
- Rev Y/Y fell at MAT by 8%
- Rev Y/Y at HAS fell 12%



• Both have international revs at 59% so their exposure is basically the same





Third Quarter Segment Net Revenues





